Governor Kemp Appoints Georgetown Native

Governor Brian Kemp announced 15 additional appointments to various state boards on May 21, 2019. Among those appointed was Georgetown native and resident Carvel Lewis. He has been appointed to the Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG) Board. The State Board of the Technical College System of Georgia is responsible for establishing standards, regulations and policies for the operation of the TCSG.

Lewis is also a member of Board of Managers for ACCG (Association of County Commissioners of Georgia) representing Georgia's consolidated governments.

Lewis has served for over 20 years on the National Hampton Alumni Association, Inc. Board, chairing various boards and serving as Southeast Region President and National Vice President for the Eastern Regions. He is a member of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. and the single father of one son, and they reside in Georgetown.
